# Building the gap between academia and practice the role of the schools of government studies

The teaching and research of Public Governance and Affairs require strong collaborations among key stakeholders. 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### **Professor Robert Nkuna**

Robert Nkuna (PhD) is a Professor of Practice at the North-West University School of Government Studies. He is currently the Director General of the Department of Planning Monitoring and Evaluation. Previously he was Director General of the Department of Telecoms and Postal Services (now the Department of Communications and Digital Technologies). He also served a term as a full-time councillor at the communications regulator ICASA.

He holds a PhD in Interdisciplinary Studies from the University of the Witwatersrand where he studied the regulation of key network industries (telecommunications, energy and transport). He also holds a Master's Degree in Public and Development Management from the same university as well as Individual Professional Award Masters Level certificates in Microeconomics and Regulation of Infrastructure and Utilities from the University of London. His academic interests mainly include topics in political economy, regulatory economics, institutional economics, public policy analysis, institutional governance as a condition for service delivery in public institutions, and bridging gaps between academia and practice.
