R.1 FACULTY RULES

R.1.1 AUTHORITY OF THE ACADEMIC RULES

The Faculty rules which apply to the different qualifications, programmes and curricula of this faculty and which are contained in this Faculty Calendar are subject to the General Rules of the University, as determined from time to time by the Council of the University on recommendation by the Senate. The faculty rules should therefore be read together with the general rules.

In instances where the Faculty rule is in contrast with a rule in terms of the General Rules of the University, the General Rules of the University will take preference.

Students who register for BA Law or B Com Law are referred to the calendars' of Faculty of Arts or Faculty of Economic and Management Sciences, respectively, for the applicable faculty rules.

R.1.2 FACULTY-SPECIFIC RULES

R.1.2.1 Modules and Credits

The subject matter for every degree is divided into modules and every module has a specific credit value. Every module is examined separately.

R.1.2.2 Relationship between credits and notional study hours

The number of credits allocated to each module is calculated according to the provisions as set out in the Higher Education Qualification Framework.

R.1.2.3 Recognition of prior learning

The Faculty of Law endorses the view that recognition of prior learning (RPL) constitutes an essential element of the transformation of access and admissions policies at education institutions in South Africa.

In light of the fact that the recognition of prior learning and module recognition and exemption must be conducted in a valid, reliable and equitable way, all applications in this regard are dealt with in terms Rule 2.3.2 of the Academic Rules as well as the relevant procedures laid down by the Faculty. Applications close on the 30th of July in view of acceptance to the University in the following year.

For the processing of an application for recognition of prior learning, a non-repayable administrative fee is payable, as determined from time to time by the University.

R.1.2.4 Application for Admission

No application shall be accepted unless the applicant complies with the general admission requirements and with the faculty specific requirements, where applicable. The admission requirements for all formal academic qualifications offered by the Faculty of Law are set out in the Admission Policy as approved by Senate and Council; which is available at: (http://www.nwu.ac.za/webfm_send/24749).

Applicants are referred to Academic Rule 1.2.1 regarding the procedure for applications for admission.

R.1.2.5 Registration

No one is registered as a student before that particular individual is admitted to a specific qualification program of the University or admitted for non-degree purposes. Registration entails the prescribed completed process that a student is required to follow to be enrolled as a student of the University as set out in the Academic Rules 1.3, 2.3, 4.3 and 5.3.

A student who has been admitted to the University registers for a specific qualification programme per annum or per semester for the duration of the study at the time determined in the annual calendar for that purpose, by paying the prescribed registration fee, completing the registration form either on paper or electronically, acquiring the required approval from faculty advisers and other functionaries concerned and submitting the form to the campus registrar concerned, upon which proof of registration is issued to the student.

It is the personal responsibility of the student to ensure that all requirements for registration for the qualification programme, curriculum and module are complied with and that no class, test or examination time table clashes between modules for which the student registers, will occur. The University reserves the right to refuse or cancel a registration where this condition is not met.

Students, who attend lectures, write tests, submit assignments and who write examinations without officially being registered receive no credits, even if the prescribed fees have been paid.

By signing and submitting the application and registration forms either on paper or electronically a student agrees to be bound by all rules, policies and decisions of the University for the duration of the student's study at the University.

R.1.2.6 Registration according to the timetable

A student is not allowed to enrol for a module, if, according to the standard lecture, test and examination timetable, a clash occurs with another module for which the student has enrolled.

Before a student finally decides on modules he/she wishes to register for he/she must ensure that the modules do not clash on the timetables. Please consult the University's time tables regarding classes <u>and</u> tests. The module combination shall not be allowed if there is a clash in respect of the student's aforementioned choices.

R.1.2.7 Professional ethics

Legal studies give access to the legal profession. To be admitted to the legal profession an applicant must be deemed a fit and proper person to serve in the profession. Due to the high ethical standards in the legal profession it is improbable that a person who has been convicted and sentenced in a court of law or against whom disciplinary measures have been taken as a result of conduct which amounts to dishonesty will be admitted to the legal profession, notwithstanding good academic results.

R.1.2.8 Medium of instruction

The language medium of the undergraduate programme at the Potchefstroom Campus is Afrikaans. Lectures for the BA Law, B Com Law as well as the LLB students are interpreted into English. Students may answer any written test and/or examination in their choice of Afrikaans or English and may write correspondence in their language of choice.

The language medium of the Postgraduate Programmes is English, with Afrikaans students being accommodated regarding assignments, dissertations, theses and examination papers.

R.1.2.9 Transitional rules

The Director Teaching and Learning and the Director of Postgraduate Programmes makes transitional rules when necessary in order to facilitate the transition from existing programmes to new programmes.

R.1.2.10 Evaluation of academic literacy

- a) In order to evaluate their ability to function in an academic environment, all undergraduate students who register at the University for the first time must report for a compulsory skills test in academic literacy, at a time and place determined by the University. The purpose of this test is to identify students who, due to inadequate academic skills, may fail to complete their study programme within the stipulated period.
- b) Students have the option of writing the compulsory skills test in English or in Afrikaans. With the exception of students who are identified as borderline cases by the test, each student has only one opportunity to write the test. Students, who are regarded as borderline cases, will be granted a second opportunity to write the test. It is the student's responsibility to establish his/her results within 14 days of writing the test and to register for the correct module and in the correct semester.
- c) Students who are regarded as at-risk cases must register for the module AGLA111 [Afrikaans] or AGLE111 [English] depending upon the language in which the compulsory skills test was written. These modules are not calculated in terms of curriculum credits, but the credits earned in this way are regarded as additional credits.
- d) Admission to the examination for AGLA111 / AGLE111 requires a participation mark of 35%. Students who are not admitted to the examination for AGLA111 / AGLE111 or who fail the relevant examination as well as two or more other modules will have to be re-evaluated by the Evaluation Committee if they want to continue their studies in the following semester. In order to avoid the termination of studies, AGLA111/AGLE111 must be completed at the end of the student's second historic year, at the very latest.
- e) Admission to the module AGLA121 / AGLE121, which is compulsory for all students who register at the University for the first time, requires that a student should first complete AGLA111 / AGLE111 and must obtain a mark of at least 40% for AGLA111 / AGLE111. The modules AGLA121 / AGLE121 constitute a value of 12 credits that form part of the curriculum for which the student has registered, and must be taken in the language in which the compulsory skills test and AGLA111 / AGLE111 were taken.

- f) AGLA/E121consists of three papers, viz. Academic Literacy, Computer and Information Skills and Reading Skills. There is a subminimum in each of the three components. The student must pass each of the three components in the same semester in which he/she has registered for the module in order to pass the module.
- g) Students who failed the module AGLA111 / AGLE111, but were allowed to continue with AGLA121 / AGLE121 and who passed the examination in this module, may have the result of AGLA111 / AGLE111 condoned by the relevant School Director to allow for a pass mark in the module.
- h) Students who have already successfully completed a module [s] / course[s] equivalent to AGLA111, 121 / AGLE111, 121 at another institution and can provide proof of this qualification, may apply in writing to the Head of the Centre for Academic and Professional Language Practice for formal recognition.

R.1.2.11 Termination of studies

A student whose academic performance is unsatisfactory receives a formal warning from the dean and is referred for academic advice and study counselling.

"Unsatisfactory academic performance" means that a student in one semester either: (1) cancelled three or more modules and/or (2) failed to obtain entrance to write the examination in three or more modules and/or (3) failed three or more modules in the examination and/or (4) received less than 40% in a year module.

An undergraduate student's studies may be terminated in terms of Academic Rule 2.4.8 if the student has already received two warnings from the dean and fails for the third time to show satisfactory academic performance, or did not obtain permission as referred to in Academic Rule 2.4.6.1 to exceed the maximum duration of the study period.

The Director of Teaching and Learning may determine the procedure to be followed whenever a student's studies are to be terminated.

The study of a postgraduate student may be terminated in terms of Academic Rule 4.4.11 and 5.4.11

R.1.2.12 Information on academic performance

The Faculty may provide information on students' academic performance to persons or institutions having a legitimate interest therein, including parents, guardians or grantors of bursaries or potential employers unless the student requests the Faculty in writing not to do so. The aforementioned request must be directed to the Administrative Manager of the Faculty of Law.

R.1.2.13 Examination- undergraduate

The examination opportunities and relevant rules are established according to rule 2.4 of the Academic Rules.

R.1.2.13.1 Written work

With regard to the preparation, submission and examining of all written work that is required of the student, the form and style requirements as amended from time to time by the Faculty Board, are applicable.

R.1.2.13.2 Composition of the participation mark

The participation mark for all Modules is compiled according to the structure of the particular module from the evaluation marks that are obtained in tests and/or assignments and/or other evaluations. The formula to compile a participation mark is specified by the Director of Teaching and Learning and Director Postgraduate Programmes from time to time and may vary from module to module.

The relation between theory and practical work in view of calculating the participation mark for a module is indicated in the relevant study guide of a module.

R.1.2.13.3 Admission to the examination - undergraduate

- a) A minimum participation mark of 40% is required for admission to the examination.
- b) For *bona fide* first-year students a minimum participation mark of 35% is sufficient for admission to the examination in the modules placed in the first semester of the first year.
- c) For undergraduate examinations there are two examination opportunities per module, of which the student may utilise one or both. A student who utilises the second examination opportunity will be liable for the prescribed fee.

R.1.2.14 Examination Subminimum

- a) The examination subminimum for undergraduate modules in the Faculty of Law with IURI, JURI, JURE and JURP code is 45%.
- b) The examination subminimum for modules that are presented by other Faculties, for example Faculty of Economic and Management Sciences and the Faculty of Arts is 40%.
- c) In the case of modules consisting of more than one independent subject, for instance JURI 414 (Road Accidents and Insurance), JURI 421 (Administration of Estates) and JURI 423 (Enrichment and Estoppel), an additional examination subminimum of 40% may be set for each separate section. In the case of JURE 412 there is a subminimum of 45% for the written heads of argument and the oral argument respectively.
- d) The examination subminimum for LLM / M Phil modules is 50%.

R.1.2.14.1 Module mark

The module mark for every module is made up of the average of the participation mark and the examination mark, unless otherwise specified for in respect of certain modules.

In the event that a student utilises both examination opportunities, the module mark is calculated on the grounds that the participation mark that gave the student exam entrance to the first examination opportunity and the mark that was obtained in the second opportunity.

R.1.2.14.2 Requirements to pass

- a) Subject to the requirements regarding an examination sub-minimum as provided for in rule R1.2.14 of the Faculty, a student passes the examination in a particular module if a module mark of at least 50% is attained.
- b) Where a first-time entering student who has registered for the first time for an undergraduate programme at the University fails any first-year module with no less than 40% in the first semester, but achieves an examination mark of at least 50% in that module, the Director of Teaching and Learning may allocate a module mark of 50% to the student.

R.1.2.14.3 Access to marked examination work-undergraduate

Students are given the opportunity to review their examination answers and they may apply for the remarking of such examination answers in accordance with the procedures adopted by the Faculty Board.

Students may be required to pay a fee for the remarking of their examination scripts.

R.1.2.14.4 Third Examination opportunity- undergraduate

A student who, having used all ordinary examination opportunities has passed all Modules but one required for a qualification, may apply to the Dean to be granted a final assessment opportunity in the outstanding module. The following guidelines are to be followed in the event of such examination opportunity:

- a) It must be the only module outstanding;
- b) The student must have obtained admission to the exam (a participation mark of at least 40%);
- c) The student must have written the examination in either the first and/or second examination opportunity;
- The student must be registered for the specific module at the NWU Potchefstroom Campus in the same year as the request (students that are registered for a particular module at UNISA may not use the third examination opportunity);
- e) The student can obtain a maximum of 50% as a final mark;
- f) Oral assessments must comply with the NWU's assessment and moderation guidelines and is done by a panel selected by the Director Teaching and Learning and/or the Dean; and
- g) the remark process is not applicable.

R.1.2.15 Awarding a degree with distinction and with distinction in a module

An undergraduate qualification is conferred with distinction where the student completes the degree in the minimum period and has achieved an average of 75% in all the core modules. For purposes of calculating the average, modules completed at other institutions and that are recognised as such by the NWU, must be taken into account.

All Modules with "IURI/JURI/JURE/JURP" in the module code are regarded as core modules for the LLB degree and therefore form part of the calculation thereof. The chosen language module (ABCD 111/112) and AGLA 111/112 do not form part of the calculation thereof.

The major subject of a BA Law degree, which is not a law module, that is taken until third year level is taken into consideration. The chosen language module (ABCD 111/121), AGLA 111/121, WVSS 221 and WVLS 314 or the equivalent of the aforementioned do not form part of the calculation.

ECON, BMAN and ACCS/ACCF in the B Com degree form part of the calculation but AGLA 111/121, WISN 123, STTN 122 and the choice module at third year's level do not form part of the calculation.

R.1.2.16 Repeating of modules

If a student fails the examination in a particular module, the module must, barring possible exceptions provided for in these Rules and in the Academic Rules be repeated in its entirety and a new participation mark must be obtained.

R.1.2.17 Registration of additional modules

- a) A student who registers for the first year level of a curriculum may only be allowed to register additionally for one module on first year level per semester not required for the curriculum concerned, provided that no timetable clashes are brought about thereby.
- b) A student who has already passed the first year of a curriculum may, with the permission of the dean concerned – which may be granted in accordance with the faculty rules - register for a maximum of two modules per semester or two year modules or one semester module and one year module, additional to the modules required for the curriculum, provided that no timetable clashes are brought about thereby and that the student passed all the modules of the previous semester.
- c) A student who failed modules may in accordance with the Faculty rules be allowed by the dean concerned to register for a maximum of two modules per semester or two year modules or one semester module and one year module, additional to the modules required for the curriculum, provided that no timetable clashes are brought about thereby.
- d) A student must first register for modules which he/she did not pass from the previous year and then for additional modules in the curriculum of the following year.

R.1.2.18 Progress in a curriculum based on prerequisites

- A module of any subject can only be taken if the student has already complied with prescribed assumed learning as stipulated in the list of modules.
- b) When a first semester module in a particular year level is set as assumed learning for a second semester module, a module mark of at least 40% must be achieved in the first semester module concerned before the student may continue with the second semester module, subject however to higher requirements that may be set in this rules.

- c) Where a module of one year level is set to be assumed learning for a module in the following year level, a pass mark (module mark) of at least 50% must be obtained in the module concerned before the student may register for the successive module.
- d) Rule 2.3.3.4 of the Academic Rules does not apply to the Faculty of Law.

R.1.3 WARNING AGAINST PLAGIARISM

R.1.4 CAPACITY STIPULATION AND SELECTION

The Faculty of Law reserves the right to select candidates before admission and not to admit applicants to the relevant qualification programmes if they do not satisfy the admission criteria, even where such applicants do meet the minimum admission requirements.

R.1.6.1 Remarks with regard to specific modules

• ABCD 111 and 121 (Language Modules)

When a student registers for a language module in the first semester (ABCD 111), the corresponding second-semester module (ABCD 121) must be taken. Consult the specific admission requirements (R 1.6.2).

Recognition of English: Students from other tertiary institutions applying for recognition of ENLL 111 and ENLL 121 may be required to be assessed by writing a language proficiency test.

BA Law students, who register for English as a language module, cannot take it as an elective module.

• AFNP 118 en AFNP 128

Non-afrikaans speaking students may register for these modules additionally, after a placement test has been written.

• AKLR 112 and 122

Ancient Culture is offered on a part-time basis.

• IURI 174, IURI 274 en IURI 375

IURI 174 is presented in two groups, Afrikaans and English, or only English on the first level. Students can choose which group they want to join. The Faculty reserves the right to limit the number of students to enter for the Afrikaans / English group. IURI 274 and 375 IURI is presented in English only.

JURE 412 (Moot Court)

The number of students who are allowed to register for the module is limited to 60. Students must obtain an examination subminimum of 45% for both the written heads of argument and the oral argument to pass the examination.

• ACCS/F prerequisites

Students that did not have Accounting as a school subject should take the Basic Accounting Course at the beginning of the first semester of the first year. Students that achieve above 65% for the course may register for ACCF111. Students with less than 65% for the course should register for ACCS111.

• Understanding the World

Students may register for any of the Understanding the World modules that are referred to in R1.6.

Students with Psychology as a major are exempted from WVLS 314.

Students with Philosophy as a major are exempted from the Understanding the World modules.

• Industrial Psychology (IOPS 311 and IOPS 321)

Students, with Industrial Psychology as major, must register for an additional module/s to the value of 32 credits in their second or third year of study. It may not be a JURI/IURI module. The following modules are recommended: STTN 111, STTN 124, PSYC 211, PSYC 212, PSYC 311, LARM 311 and LARM 321.

Students who intend to register for Honours in Industrial Psychology are recommended to register for the following modules: PSYC 121, PSYC 211, PSYC 212, PSYC 221 PSYC 311, PSYC 321 and STTN 124

Students who intend to register for Honours in Human Resource Management are recommended to register for the following modules: LARM111, LARM211, LARM221, LARM311 and 321 and STTN111, 124

R.1.6.2 Specific Faculty requirements for admission to language modules

R.1.6.2.1 Afrikaans and Dutch

- a) Admission to Afrikaans: Language without borders (AFLL 111) and Afrikaans and Dutch Language and Literary Studies (AFLL 121) requires at least a level 4 for Afrikaans as home language, or a level 5 for Afrikaans as first additional language for grade 12.
- b) Students, who comply with the entrance requirements for AFLL111 and 121, but still experience communication problems, will be referred to the Chairperson for the Subject Group Afrikaans and Dutch.

R.1.6.2.2 Setswana

Students who passed a Sotho language like Setswana, Southern Sotho or Northern Sotho as home language in the grade 12 examination, or who have one of these languages as their mother tongue, may not register for the Third Language courses in Setswana (ATSN111, ATSN121).

R.1.6.2.3 German

- GERM111 and GERB111 are beginner's courses. No prior knowledge of German is required to register for these modules, but students must have a matriculation exemption certificate.
- b) Students who passed matric German with a final mark of 65% or higher or have obtained a certificate equal to level A2 of the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages from an accredited language learning institution may not register for GERM111/121 or GERB111/121. They may register for GERM211/221. If this qualification has been obtained more than 2 years prior to registration for German, an admission test is required. The results of this test will determine whether a student will be allowed to register for GERM111/121 or GERB 111/121 or GERM211/221. Allowances could be made under exceptional circumstances after having consulted with the subject chairperson.
- c) Students with prior knowledge of German, but who do not have official proof of proficiency, will be required to partake in an admission test. The results of this test will determine whether a student will be allowed to register for GERM111/121 or GERB111/121 or GERM211/221.
- d) The credits of the modules from which the student has been exempted, are not awarded.
- e) Students who have passed GERB111 and 121 will be allowed to continue with GERM211/221.
- f) Credits cannot be obtained for both GERM111 and GERB111 neither for both GERMN121 and GERB121.

R.1.6.2.4 English

- a) ENLS111 (practical module): It is strongly recommended that students with a matriculation result below 60% in English as a second language (L2), or a result below 50% in English as a first language (L1) should enrol for this module.
- b) ENLL111 (academic module): It is strongly recommended that students with a matriculation result of 60% or more in L2, or a result of 50% or more in L1 should enrol for this module.
- c) ENLL121: To register for the second semester academic module (ENLL121), a student must have obtained a mark of 60% or more for the corresponding module of the first semester (ENLL111). Students who failed to obtain 60% or more for ENLL111 will be transferred to the practical module of the second semester (ENLS121). However, the English subject group can consider special cases for admission to ENLL121.
- d) Students who are registered for the academic modules are required to report for supplementary reading evaluations in the reading laboratory. Students who have not achieved the required skills level will have to follow supplementary reading programmes

R.1.6.2.5 French

- FREN111 and FREB11 are beginner's courses. No prior knowledge of French is required to register for these modules, but students must have a matriculation exemption certificate.
- b) Students who passed matric French with a final mark of 65% or higher or have obtained a certificate equal to level A2 of the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages from an accredited language learning institution may not register for FREN111/121 or FREB111/121. They may register for FREN211/221. If this qualification has been obtained more than 2 years prior to registration for French, an admission test is required. The results of this test will determine whether a student will be allowed to register for FREN111/121 or FREN211/221. Allowances could be made under exceptional circumstances after having consulted with the subject head.
- c) Students with prior knowledge of French, but who do not have official proof of proficiency, will be required to partake in an admission test. The results of this test will determine whether a student will be allowed to register for FREN111/121 or FREN211/221.
- d) The credits of the modules from which the student has been exempted, are not awarded.
- e) Students who have passed FREB111 and 121 will be allowed to continue with FREN211/221.
- f) Credits cannot be obtained for both FREN111 and FREB111 neither for both FREN121 and FREB121

R.1.6.2.6 Latin

A student who passed Latin in grade 12 may register for LATN211, but then only in the second year of study.

R.1.7 RULES FOR THE DEGREE BACHELOR OF LAWS (LLB)

R.1.7.1 Duration (minimum and maximum duration)

The duration of the Bachelor of Laws (LLB) degree is a minimum of four years and a maximum of five years.

The LLB can also be obtained as a second baccalaureus degree. A student can, for example, enrol for the Bachelor of Arts (BA) degree with Law Subjects or for a Bachelor of Commerce (B Com) degree with Law subjects. Law subjects passed during the course of these degrees need not be repeated in the LLB. The consequence of this is that the LLB can be obtained after only, but at least, two further years of study. The duration of LLB studies that follow on the above-mentioned baccalaureus degrees is a maximum of three years.

R.1.7.2 Admission requirements for the qualification

- a) No tertiary education qualification is required for admission to the degree.
- b) A prospective student with matriculation exemption and an APS score of 26 or higher qualify for admission to LLB studies.
- c) Consult the Admission Requirements for Undergraduate Study 2015 for the manner in which the APS score must be calculated. The document is available on the NWU website under prospective students at <u>prospective-students/study-potchefstroom-pukke</u>.
- d) Candidates should take cognizance of the fact that, owing to specific capacity constraints, the faculty reserves the right to select candidates for admission to the qualifications as offered by the faculty. This means that prospective students who comply with the minimum requirements may not necessarily be admitted to the relevant program.

R.1.7.3 Re-admission after interruption of studies

- a) Where a student's study is interrupted for a year or longer, such a student must apply anew for admission by completing the relevant form and by obtaining the written permission of the dean concerned to be re-admitted.
- b) With the exclusion of exceptions as approved by the Director of Teaching and Learning, students who need only a few modules to complete the LLB degree and who wish to resume their studies after an interruption of 5 years or longer, should register for at least two years full time. Certain students may be expected to repeat modules which they have already passed.
- c) Students who completed the BA Law or the B Com Law degrees and who wish to register for the LLB degree after a lapse of 5 years or longer, may be expected to repeat modules already passed. Recognition may be given in accordance with the provisions contained in Academic Rule 2.3.2.
- d) With the exclusion of exceptions as approved by the Director of Teaching and Learning, students who have obtained a B Proc-degree should

register for at least 2 years full time. Recognition may be given in accordance with the provisions contained in Academic Rule 2.3.2 depending upon the circumstances of each case.

R.1.7.4 Program outcomes

R.1.7.4.1 Qualification purpose

In addition to the academic and principle-oriented shaping of students, the programme has the following objectives:

- a) to equip students with knowledge and specific skills, related to the ability to apply the acquired knowledge and skills in a variety of branches of the legal profession with a view to further personal intellectual development, economic activities and community service;
- b) to help sufficient numbers of qualified legal professionals enter the private and public sector in South Africa to ensure that all the diverse needs in terms of legal services, leadership and innovative, knowledge-based activities of a transforming society within the South African legal state are met in a sustainable manner; and
- c) to equip qualified people to undertake further studies and research at postgraduate level for purposes of obtaining a postgraduate qualification.

R.1.7.4.2 Rationale

The LLB programme produces lawyers who are conversant with the foundations and principles of legal scholarship and who are equipped to work independently with the law in concrete situations.

R.1.7.4.3 Graduate attributes

Upon completion of the LLB qualification the candidate should demonstrate the following:

- a) integrated knowledge and understanding of the historical and jurisprudential development of the law, the role of Law in society in general, and the principles of SA, regional and international Law, as well as the ability to engage with and apply the general principles within relevant contexts;
- b) the ability to engage with and address ethical issues pertaining to the academic environment, legal practice and society towards the establishment of a professional identity and responsibility;
- c) the ability to investigate, critically analyse, understand and solve complex real-life and/or hypothetical problems in a coherent and creative manner, demonstrating advanced use of critical thinking in legal practice;
- the ability to formulate, present and communicate insightful and creative academic and professional ideas and arguments effectively - verbally and in writing, using appropriate media and communication technology and suitable research methods;
- e) the ability to read, interpret and draft legal documents, including statutes;
- f) competence in legal skills, both in general and specific to the profession, including relevant computer and numerical skills;

- g) the ability to work effectively as part of a team to solve discipline-related problems and to take responsibility for task-specific outcomes and appropriate use of relevant resources;
- h) the ability to apply, in a self-critical manner, appropriate learning strategies to effectively address professional and lifelong learning;
- i) a commitment to social justice, the promotion of human rights and good citizenship.

R.1.7.5 Articulation possibilities

- After successful completion of the degree, the student whose achievements are of a sufficient standard can obtain direct admission to LLM studies.
- b) Credit for modules attained by students enrolled at other campuses for this curriculum can be requested from the Director Teaching and Learning as modules with the same outcomes are offered in the same semesters and on the same NQF levels. If it happens that modules with the same outcomes are not offered in the same semester and same NQF level, students will nevertheless be accommodated subject to time table constraints.
- c) Credit for modules attained at other universities can be requested from the Director Teaching and Learning. The request will be considered in the light of the question whether such modules contribute to the abovementioned programme outcomes.

R.1.7.6 Mini-dissertation (JURI 425)

- a) The successful completion of a mini-dissertation (JURI 425) is a requirement for the completion of the degree.
- b) As far as the registration, preparation, submission and examination of the Research Report are concerned, the form and style requirements as amended from time to time by the Faculty Board, are applicable.

R.1.8 RULES FOR THE BACHELOR OF ARTS WITH LAW SUBJECTS

R.1.8.1 Duration (minimum and maximum duration)

The duration for the degree BA with Law Subjects is a minimum of three years and a maximum of four years.

R.1.8.2 Admission requirements for the qualification

- a) No tertiary education qualification is required for admission to this degree.
- b) A prospective student with matriculation exemption and an APS score of 26 or more qualifies for admission to the studies.
- c) Consult Admission Requirements for Undergraduate Study 2014 for the manner in which the APS score must be calculated. This document is available at <u>prospective-students/study-potchefstroom-pukke</u>
- d) Candidates should take cognizance of the fact that, due to specific capacity constraints, the faculty reserves the right to select candidates for admission to qualifications offered by the Faculty. This means that prospective students who comply with the minimum requirements may not necessarily be admitted to the relevant courses

R.1.8.3 Re-admission after interruption of studies

- a) Where a student's study is interrupted for a year or longer, such a student must apply anew for admission to the NWU and has to obtain the written permission of the dean concerned to be re-admitted.
- b) Students who were enrolled for the BA Law at this University, who did not complete their studies and apply to be re-admitted after 3 years in order to complete the degree, may be expected to repeat all the prescribed modules for the third year level. The faculty may refuse to recognize modules from other year levels; it will be dependent on the circumstances of each case.

R.1.8.4 Registration of modules at other institutions

- a) In order to reach the programme outcomes of the BA Law, it is not possible to complete third-year modules offered by the Faculty of Arts through another institution, such as UNISA. If one or more such third-level modules are needed to complete the degree, the student must return full time to pass the modules. In exceptional circumstances, and with the approval of the Director Teaching and Learning, subject to prescribed conditions, class exemption may be organised with the specific lecturer.
- b) Exemption from classes can only be given if the module has been attended previously, admission to the exam was received, but the exam was not passed. Exemption from classes will only be granted once. If the module is then not passed, it must again be taken full time).
- c) A maximum of two modules may be completed on second year level through another institution to complete the degree, provided that those are the only modules that are needed to complete the degree in that year.
- d) The introductory modules on first year level overlap to certain extend and the equivalent thereof can be acknowledged if it is necessary to complete the degree.
- e) IURI and JURI modules on any year level may be completed at another institution with the understanding that the student will not be allowed to

register for more than three modules, in total, of the qualification at another institution.

R.1.8.5 Programme outcomes

R.1.8.5.1 Qualification purpose

In addition to the academic and principle-oriented education of students, the BA Law program has the following objectives:

- a) to equip students with the knowledge of the prescribed substantive law and specific skills, related to the ability to apply the acquired knowledge and skills in a selection of branches of law, and the field of humanities, generally with a view to further personal intellectual development, economic activities and community services; and
- b) to provide the foundation for and to produce qualified people to undertake further studies and research in the fields of law and/or humanities for purposes of obtaining a LLB or postgraduate qualification.

R.1.8.5.2 Rationale

The BA Law programme educates students in the field of humanities in order to be able to integrate basic knowledge and techniques of the human sciences and law together with the necessary skills to investigate human phenomena and to solve concrete problems related to human sciences and specific fields of law.

Upon completion of the BA Law qualification, the candidate should demonstrate:

- a) Integrated knowledge and understanding of the historical and jurisprudential development of the law, the role of Law in society in general and some principles of South African law, as well as the ability to engage with and apply the general principles within relevant contexts.
- b) the ability to identify, engage with and address ethical issues pertaining to the academic environment, legal practice and society in general;
- c) the ability to investigate (research), critically analyse, understand and solve complex real-life and/or hypothetical problems in a coherent and creative manner, demonstrating advanced use of critical thinking and research skills;
- the ability to formulate, present and communicate insightfully and creative academic and professional ideas and arguments effectively – verbally and in written, using appropriate media and communication technology and suitable research methods;
- e) the ability to read, interpret and draft legal documents;
- f) competence in some legal skills including relevant language, computer and numeric skills;
- g) the ability to work effectively as part of a team to solve problems situated in the fields of humanities and/or law and to take responsibility for taskspecific outcomes and appropriate use of relevant sources;

- h) the ability to apply, in a self-critical manner, appropriate learning strategies to effectively address professional and life-long learning; and
- i) a commitment to social justice, the promotion of human rights and good citizenship.

R1.8.6 Articulation possibilities

- a) After successful completion of the degree, students comply with the requirements of the first two years of studies for the LLB degree. The outstanding modules that are required for the LLB must be completed within the next two years of study.
- b) After successful completion of the degree, students can obtain direct access to an applicable honours degree in terms of the rules of the applicable faculty.
- c) Credit for modules attained by students enrolled at other campuses for this curriculum can be requested as modules with the same outcomes are offered in the same semesters and on the same NQF levels. If it happens that modules with the same outcomes are not offered in the same semester and same NQF level, students will nevertheless be accommodated subject to time table constraints.
- d) A student may apply for credit for modules attained at other universities. The aforementioned application must be in writing and submitted to the Director of Teaching and Education. The application will be considered in light of the question whether such modules contribute to the programme outcomes.

R.1.9 RULES FOR THE BACELOR OF COMMERCE (B COM) WITH LAW SUBJECT

The minimum duration of study for a B Com degree is three years and the maximum duration for the completion of the degree is four years.

- c) Maths at level 4 (50%-59%)
- Consult Admission Requirements for Undergraduate Study 2013 for the manner in which the APS score must be calculated. The document is available at <u>prospective-students/study-potchefstroom-pukke</u>
- e) Candidates should take cognizance of the fact that, due to specific capacity constraints, the faculty reserves the right to select candidates for admission to the qualifications as offered by the faculty. This means that prospective students who comply with the minimum requirements may not necessarily be admitted to the relevant programme.

R.1.9.3 Readmission after interruption of studies

- a) Where a student's study is interrupted for a year or longer, such a student must apply anew for admission to the NWU and has to obtain the written permission for readmission.
- b) Students who were enrolled for the B Com Law at this University, who did not complete their studies and who apply to be re-admitted after 3 years in order to complete the degree, should at least repeat all the prescribed modules for the third year level. The faculty may refuse to recognise modules from other year levels depending upon the circumstances of each case.

R.1.9.4 Registration of modules at other institutions

- a) In order to reach the programme outcomes of the B Com Law, it is not possible to complete third-year modules offered by the Faculty of Economic and Management Science through another institution, such as UNISA. If one or more such third-year level modules are needed to complete the degree, the student must return full time to pass the modules. In exceptional circumstances, class exemption (with the approval of the Director of Teaching and Learning and subject to specific conditions) can be organised with the specific lecturer. Exemption from classes can only be given if the module has been attended previously, admission to the exam was received, but the exam was not passed. Exemption from classes will only be granted once. If the module is then not passed, it must again be taken full time).
- b) A maximum of two modules can be completed on second year level through another institution to complete the degree, provided that those are the only modules that are needed to complete the degree in that year.

c) The introductory modules on first level have greater overlaps and the equivalent can be acknowledged if it is necessary to complete the degree.

In addition to the academic and principle-oriented education of students, the B COM Law qualification aims to:

- equip students with the knowledge of the prescribed substantive law and specific skills, related to the ability to apply the acquired knowledge and skills in various branches of the legal profession, economic and business environments (private and public sector) with a view to further personal intellectual development, economic activities and community services; and
- b) provide the foundation for and to produce qualified people to undertake further studies and research in the legal, economic, management and business environments for purposes of obtaining a LLB or postgraduate qualification in any of the specialisation fields.

R.1.9.5.2 Rationale

The B Com law program delivers graduates in the fields of law, economics and business who are able to integrate basic knowledge, techniques and expertise in each of the specialised fields, and who are empowered to apply the acquired knowledge, principles, theories and skills in relevant environments in society, to think critically and innovatively and to solve complex problems.

R.1.9.5.3 Graduate attributes

Upon completion of the B Com Law qualification the candidate should demonstrate:

- a) detailed and integrated knowledge and understanding of the historical and jurisprudential development of the law, the role of Law in society in general, certain concepts, principles, structures and theories of South African law, economics and business as well as the ability to engage with and apply the acquired knowledge within relevant contexts;
- b) the ability to identify, engage with and address ethical issues pertaining to the academic, legal, economic and business environments and society in general and to act accordingly with integrity and professionally;
- c) the ability to investigate, critically analyse, understand and solve complex real-life and/or hypothetical economic, business and/or legal related problems in a coherent and creative manner, demonstrating advanced use of his/her multidisciplinary knowledge, ability to collect, analyse and organise information, critical thinking and research skills;
- the ability to formulate, present and communicate insightful and creative academic and professional ideas and opinions in well-formed arguments effectively (verbally and in writing), using appropriate media and communication technologies and suitable research methods;
- e) the ability to read, interpret and draft legal and other documents;

- f) competence in certain legal skills including relevant language, computer and numerical skills;
- g) the ability to work effectively as an individual and as part of a team to solve problems situated in the fields of law, economics and/or business and to take responsibility for task-specific outcomes and appropriate use of relevant resources;
- h) the ability to apply, in a self-disciplined way, with integrity and commitment, appropriate learning strategies to effectively address professional and lifelong learning;
- i) a commitment to social justice, the promotion of human rights and good citizenship and
- to be sensitive to the socio-economic needs of our heterogenic and multicultural business communities and of the world in general.

R.1.9.6 Articulation possibilities

- Vertically, the B Com qualification articulates a competency to apply for admission to NQR level 8 qualifications specifically honours qualifications in the student's selected specialist field.
- b) The B Com qualification may grant the student admission to related studies at other institutions for higher education
- c) After successful completion of the degree, the students comply with the requirements of the first two years of studies for the LLB degree. The outstanding modules that are required for the LLB must be completed within the next two years of study.
- d) Credit for modules attained at other universities can be requested from the Director Teaching and Learning. The request will be considered in the light of the question whether such modules contribute to the abovementioned programme outcomes.

R.1.9.7 Compilation of curriculum R301P

A new curriculum (R302P) will be introduced from 2013; whilst curriculum R301P is phased out. Repeaters modules follow the transitional arrangements and rules set out in R.3 on page 125.

R.1.10 RULES FOR THE DEGREE MASTER OF LAWS (LLM) AND MAGISTER PHILOSOPHIAE (MPHIL)

The LLM/MPhil is a qualification aimed at developing advanced research skills. The degrees can be obtained by either writing a research dissertation or by writing a mini-dissertation as well as by successfully completing examinations in the modules prescribed for a focused qualification in Labour Law, Estate Law, Import and Export Law, Environmental Law and Governance or Comparative Child Law.

R.1.10.1 Duration (minimum and maximum duration)

- a) The study period is at least one year. A student has to meet all the requirements for the LLM / MPhil degree within two years after registration. If a student has not completed the study within two years, the study will be terminated. The Director of Postgraduate Programmes may, however, agree to an extension after consideration of:
 - progress already made by the student;
 - the probability that the student will complete it;
 - whether the subject of the study or of the proposed dissertation or mini-dissertation is still relevant and meaningful;
 - whether there are other students who have done, are doing or wish to do research on the same topic; and
 - whether the supervisor is still available.
- b) The closing date for application for the structured and research LLM/MPhil is 30 November of the previous year.
- c) The closing date for registration for the structured and research LLM/MPhil is 31 January the following year.
- d) Full-time LLM/MPhil students as well as those students who want to complete their degree in the said year must submit the research proposals for dissertations or mini-dissertations before 30 June.

R.1.10.2 Admission requirements for the qualification

a) To gain admission to the LLM programme, a student has to meet all the requirements set by this university or any other South African university for the LLB degree. A student in possession of another four year legal degree of this or another university may apply for admission to the LLM degree.

Such a student must furnish sufficient written proof of his/her knowledge and practical experience in the specific field of study.

- An evaluation certificate as issued by the South African Qualifications Authority (SAQA) must be submitted if a previous qualification was obtained in a foreign country.
 If necessary a student must deliver proof of proficiency in English (TOEFL- computer based test)
- c) The Director of Postgraduate Programmes may furthermore require that a student furnish sufficient proof of his/her research skills before the student receives permission to register.

- d) If a student wishes to obtain an LLM degree in a subject not included in the LLB or in which the student's achievements are not of a sufficient standard, an admission examination in the subject in question can be prescribed by the Director of Postgraduate Programmes.
- e) As far as the LLM in Estate Law is concerned, a student is required to successfully complete an introductory course in Tax Law or submit proof that an equivalent module was passed at another tertiary institution. Exceptions will be allowed subject to the approval of the Director Postgraduate Programmes.
- f) To gain admission to the MPhil in Environmental Law and Governance, a student who meets all the requirements of a four year university degree may apply for admission to the MPhil in Environmental Law and Governance. Such a student must first successfully complete the following undergraduate modules (or module equivalents at another South African university): Introduction to Law; Law of Property, Constitutional Law, Administrative Law and Environmental Law. Before being allowed to register, the student may be required to provide the Director of Postgraduate Programmes with sufficient written evidence of knowledge and practical experience in the relevant field.
- g) In the case of the LLM in Comparative Child Law, students may be subject to a selection process or interviewed before being admitted, to establish their ability to complete the LLM study. New enrolments for the degree are accepted only if the Director of Postgraduate Programmes is of the opinion that there is sufficient demand for the programme. Students may also be subjected to a language proficiency test.
- h) The LLM Programmes and elective modules are only offered if the Director of Postgraduate Programmes is of the opinion that there is sufficient demand for the programme/ modules/s.
- Students can only register for a research topic in any module when sufficient supervision is available and if the Director of Postgraduate Programmes is of the opinion that there will be sufficient expertise for support and guidance to a student in the faculty.
- A student can only register for a module/s for non-degree purposes if he/she can present proof of preceding knowledge on a HEQF level 8.

R.1.10.3 Qualification outcomes

On completion of this programme the student should be able to demonstrate:

- A comprehensive and systematic knowledge base in a specific field of study and the ability to apply the knowledge;
- A coherent and critical understanding of the methodology of the specific field of study so as to rigorously critique and evaluate current research in this field, participate in scholarly debates and research relating to theory and practice;
- c) An ability to use advanced information-retrieval and processing skills to identify, critically analyse and synthesize information relevant to complex and/or real-world problems, cases and issues in the field of the specific field of study where applicable, debating solutions from theoretical and research perspectives published in current literature and presenting the information to specialist and non-specialist audiences using IT effectively; and

d) The ability to critically evaluate and apply the ethics, values, rules, norms and regulations pertaining to the specific field of study.

R.1.10.4 Faculty-specific requirements

R.1.10.4.1 Examination

R.1.10.4.1.1 LLM obtained through the writing of a research dissertation

- a) A student is required to pass an oral examination in a major and two ancillary subjects prescribed in consultation with the Director of Postgraduate Programmes for the specific study, if he/she wishes to be permitted to write a research dissertation. The evaluation of the student takes place by means of an oral examination by a panel appointed by the Director of Postgraduate Programmes, of which at least one member must be an expert who is not in the employ of the University. The appointment of examiners and the assessment are conducted in accordance with the procedure approved by the Faculty Board and published on eFundi. The student may also request that the evaluation be done by means of examination papers or other written assignments, in which case the examination papers and assignments must be moderated externally.
- b) Students work under the supervision of a supervisor appointed by the Director of Postgraduate Programmes and the Faculty Board.
- c) Students are also required to attend seminars in the module Research Methodology, to obtain at least 50% for each assignment and/or presentation.
- d) The suggested guideline for the length of a dissertation is 120 A4 pages (content) typed in 12 point Arial font with 1½ line spacing. Any substantial digression from this guideline is subject to the prior approval of the Director of Postgraduate programmes before submission of the dissertation for examination. The Director of Postgraduate Programmes will determine whether the length of the dissertation is appropriate in the particular case. Students must comply with the prescribed faculty reference style. Refer to the Style Reference Manual available at: http://www.nwu.ac.za/af/webfm_send/57124
- e) Students must comply with the requirements of Academic Rules 4.4.2
- f) In order to be admitted to write a dissertation the student must submit an acceptable research proposal to the Director of Postgraduate Programmes. The research proposal must be written under the supervision of the supervisor. The Research Proposal must be approved by the Research Unit and the faculty Board.
- g) Before submission, the dissertation must be sent electronically to the administrative official of the Faculty. The Turnitin report which is generated must be submitted with the dissertation.
- h) A student may also be expected to prepare an article for submission for publication as a full length article in an accredited journal.
- i) The research dissertation is assessed according to the Academic Rule A 75.

- j) The research dissertation must be language edited **by an accredited editor** and a certificate from the editor must be attached.
- k) The research dissertation is assessed by an internal examiner (who is not involved with supervision of the study) and an external examiner who is not attached to the University. The final mark of the research dissertation is the average of the two examiners' marks. If there is any ambiguity in an examiner's report, or if there is a significant difference in the final result recommended by the examiners, the procedure as approved by the Faculty Board and published on eFundi will determine the final result of the student. The general provisions relating to assessment of the dissertation and the directions to examiners and/or arbitrators are followed in accordance with guidelines published on eFundi.
- A research dissertation or mini-dissertation may only once be referred back to a student and after revision be submitted for examination (Refer to Academic Rule 4.4.4.8).
- m) A student's studies may be terminated if he/she fails to comply with the requirements laid down by the faculty or exceeds the maximum duration of the study period as determined by the faculty and has previously received a letter of warning (Refer to Academic Rules 4.4.11.1).
- n) A student, who is dissatisfied with any aspect of the guidance with which the student was provided by a supervisor or promoter, can raise such matters in writing to the Director Postgraduate Programmes. The director must respond in writing to the student before a research dissertation or mini-dissertation is submitted for examination.

R.1.10.4.1.2 Structured LLM/MPhil

- a) Besides writing a mini-dissertation, assessment in each of the modules in the programme of the particular structured LLM/MPhil is conducted by means of written examination papers or oral assessment.
- b) The student must inter alia demonstrate at an advanced level that he/she is able to:
 - determine the applicable framework, values and principles and to engage with it in a scholarly manner; and to
 - conduct research on the relevant legal rules in a scientific manner and apply the rules to factual situations
- c) Students must complete assignments that comply with the research and style requirements of the faculty. The marks awarded for these assignments are taken into account in calculating the final mark for the module. The marks achieved for the assignments, count 25% towards the final mark for the module.
- d) If a dispute about a module mark (excluding a thesis or dissertation) arises, it must be referred to the program leader. If not satisfactorily resolved, it is referred to the Director Postgraduate Programmes. If it still is not resolved, it is referred for final resolution to the dean.
- e) Students work under the supervision of a supervisor appointed by the Director of postgraduate Programmes and the Faculty Board.
- f) To gain admission to the writing of a mini-dissertation, the student must successfully complete a module in research methodology and, in

consultation with his/her supervisor, submit a satisfactory research proposal to the Director of Postgraduate Programmes and the Faculty Board.

- g) Before submission, the mini-dissertation must be sent electronically to the administrative official of the Faculty. The report which is generated must be submitted with the dissertation.
- h) The student must prepare a mini-dissertation of at least 60 pages (content) A4 1 ½ spacing Font Arial 12 pt.
- i) The student may be expected to prepare an article for submission for publication as a full length article in an accredited law journal.
- j) The mini-dissertation must be language edited by an accredited language editor and a certificate issued by the language editor must be attached.
- k) The mini-dissertation is assessed by an internal examiner (who is not involved with supervision of the study) and an external examiner who is not attached to the University. The final mark of the dissertation is the average of the two examiners' marks. If there is any ambiguity in an examiner's report, or if there is a 15% difference in the results recommended by two examiners, the procedure as approved by the Faculty Board and published on eFundi will determine the final result of the student.
- Admission to the examination in any module is gained by obtaining 50% in every assignment.
- m) The examination sub minimum for all LLM / M Phil modules is 50%.
- n) All examination answer scripts are moderated by an appointed internal and external moderator.
- o) The final mark for the degree is calculated by awarding a proportion of 50% to the mark obtained for the mini-dissertation, 25% for the research assignments, and 25% to the marks obtained in the examination papers. (for Labour Law refer to R1.10.5.2.1) and for Comparative Child Law refer to R1.10.5.2.5). Students with a final mark of 75% and above pass the degree with distinction.
- p) A mini-dissertation may only once be referred back to a student and after revision be submitted for examination (Refer to Academic Rule 4.4.4.8).
- q) A student's studies may be terminated if he/she fails to comply with the requirements laid down by the faculty or exceeds the maximum duration of the study period as determined by the faculty and has previously received a letter of warning (Refer to Academic Rule 4.4.11).
- r) The LLM Labour Law: The final mark for the degree is calculated as follows: 60% of the marks obtained for the mini-dissertation, 20% of the marks obtained for the research assignments and 20% of the marks obtained for the modules in the final examination.

R.1.10.5 Programmes for the LLM/MPhil Degree

R.1.10.5.1 LLM attained by research and writing a research dissertation

The degree may be awarded on the strength of a research dissertation on a topic in any discipline in respect of which, according to the judgement of the Director of Postgraduate Programmes, sufficient expertise is available in the Faculty for effective guidance to students. Students must also attend the discussion sessions of the module **Research Methodology** and successfully complete, pass the assignments in the module and participate in the scheduled practical presentations.

1.10.5.2.6.1 Internal assessment: LLM Comparative Child Law

- Besides writing a mini-dissertation, assessment in each of the modules in the programme will be conducted by means of a written examination paper or an oral examination.
- b) Participation of students in a module is monitored by way of assignments, which shall comply with the style requirements of the faculty and the level descriptors for master's programmes (HEQ requirements); and also by way of group discussions and oral presentations, which must be professionally presented by making use of among others, appropriate IT.
- c) The marks awarded for these assignments are taken into account in calculating the final mark for the module.
- d) The marks achieved for the assignments count in the case of curriculum R807P 33% towards the final mark for the module. In the case of curriculum R808P the marks achieved for the assignments count 25%.
- e) To gain admission to the writing of a mini-dissertation, the student must complete a module in research methodology and, in consultation with his or her supervisor, submit a satisfactory research proposal to the various Faculty Boards.
- f) The mini-dissertation must, in the opinion of the examiners, be suitable for publication as a full-length article in an accredited law journal.
- g) The final mark for the degree is calculated in the case of curriculum R807P by awarding a proportion of 34% to the mark obtained for the minidissertation, 33% to the marks for the research assignments and 33% to

the marks obtained in the final examination of the modules. In the case of curriculum R808P the final mark is calculated by awarding a proportion of 25% for the assignments, 25% for the final examination and 50% for the mini-dissertation.

1.10.5.2.6.2 External moderation: LLM Comparative Child Law

An external moderator in the field of a specific module is appointed. The external moderator moderates the exam paper and memorandum/assessment framework as well as the written exams of the students. The work plan or study guides as well as a memorandum or assessment framework will be provided to the external examiner.

The exam papers are moderated within one week and returned to the programme directors for review. The process is appropriate to the mode of delivery as an expert from another university and/or institution will confirm or question the grades given by the lecturer within an acceptable timeframe. The dissertation will be moderated in the same manner. Supervisors are not involved in the assessment of the mini-dissertation.

R.1.11 RULES FOR THE DEGREE DOCTOR OF LAWS (LLD)

R.1.11.1 LLD obtained by writing a thesis

The degree may be awarded on the strength of a thesis on a topic in any field of law in respect of which, according to the opinion of the Director of Postgraduate Programmes, sufficient expertise is available in the Faculty for effective guidance to students. It is recommended that students attend the contact sessions in respect of the Research Methodology module. Students must also orally present their research proposal to the Faculty.

R.1.11.2 Duration (minimum and maximum duration)

- a) The study period extends over a period of at least two years. A student must meet all the requirements for the LLD degree within four years after registration. The study will be terminated if it has not been completed within four years. The Director of Postgraduate Programmes may, however, agree to an extension of one year after consideration of:
 - the progress already made;
 - the probability that the student will complete it;
 - the question of whether the original motivation has not already lapsed;
 - whether there are other students who have done, are doing or want to do research on the same topic; and
 - whether the promoter is still available.
- b) The closing date for application is 15 November of the previous year.
- c) The closing date for registration is 31 January the following year.
- d) Full-time LLD students must submit the research proposals for the thesis by 30 November in the first year of registration.

R.1.11.3 Admission requirements

a) To gain admission to the LLD, a student must have obtained an LLM degree from this university or from another South African university or must have the status of such a master's degree granted, on request, by the Senate. The Director of Postgraduate Programmes may also insist that the student submit adequate proof of his/her research capabilities before permission to register is granted.

b) The student has to submit a two (2) page research proposal with their application in order for the Faculty to determine if sufficient expertise is available, to provide guidance and to appoint a promoter.

c) An evaluation certificate as issued by the **South African Qualifications Authority (SAQA)** must be submitted if a previous qualification was obtained in a foreign country

If necessary a student must deliver proof of proficiency in English (TOEFL-computer based test)

R.1.11.4 Examination

- a) In order to be admitted to the writing of a thesis, a student is required to pass an examination in a major and two ancillary subjects prescribed for the specific study by the promoter in collaboration with the Director Postgraduate Programmes. The evaluation of the student takes place before an appointed panel consisting of the Dean, Director of Postgraduate Programmes (*ex officio*) and two members of the Faculty and/or two external members with expertise outside the University. The appointment of examiners and assessment procedure are conducted in accordance with the procedure approved by the Faculty Board and published on eFundi.
- b) A student may be exempted from the oral examination by the Director of Postgraduate Programmes on the grounds of satisfactory evidence that a comparable and appropriate examination was taken by the student in preparation for obtaining the LLM or after assessment of the student's prior learning or practical experience.
- c) A thesis is examined in accordance with the appropriate provisions of the Academic Rules by one internal examiner, who is not involved in supervision of the study, and two external examiners as approved by the Director of Postgraduate Programmes and Faculty Board.
- d) The promoter submits a comprehensive report with a recommendation based on the examiners' reports. If there is any ambiguity in an examiner's report, or if there is a significant difference in the final result recommended by the examiners, the procedure approved by the Faculty Board and published on eFundi will determine the final result of the student. The general provisions and guidelines in connection with the assessment of the thesis and the directions to examiners and/or arbitrators are followed in accordance with guidelines published on eFundi.
- e) Before submission, the thesis must be sent electronically to the administrative official of the Faculty. The Turnitin-report which is generated must be submitted with the thesis.

- f) The thesis must be language edited and a certificate issued by an accredited language editor must be attached.
- g) The submission of the thesis for examination must be according to academic rules 5.4.2-5.4.4
- h) A candidate must, during the course of their doctoral studies, prepare and submit a publication relating to the subject matter of his/her thesis. The aforementioned publication must be approved by the promoter and must be submitted to an accredited law journal before the thesis may be submitted for final examination.

R.1.11.5 Termination of Studies

A student's studies may be terminated in the event that the student fails to comply with the rules of the Faculty; if the maximum study period has been exceeded and the student has already received a warning letter from the faculty.

R.1.11.6 Qualification outcomes:

After completing the LLD, student must be able to demonstrate the following:

- A comprehensive and systematic knowledge base in a specific field of study and the ability to apply the knowledge;
- b) Submit proof of thorough proficiency in the appropriate research skills by formulating a relevant and viable research topic, motivating it on the basis of a clear problem statement, developing points of departure, suppositions and hypotheses, setting a framework for the solution of the complex problem and by designing a feasible research programme;
- c) A coherent and critical understanding of the methodology of the specific field of study so as to rigorously critique and evaluate current research in this field, participate in scholarly debates and research relating to theory and practice and adopt independent points of view;
- d) The ability to use advanced information-retrieval and processing skills to identify, critically analyse and synthesize information relevant to issues in the area of specialisation, debating solutions from theoretical and research perspectives published in current literature;
- e) The ability to critically evaluate and apply the ethics, values, rules, norms and regulations pertaining to the field of Law;
- f) The ability to make a significant and original academic contribution to the field of law and communicate this in a thesis which meets international standards.

R.3 TRANSITIONAL ARRANGEMENTS AND RULES FOR THE NEW CURRICULA: BA LAW, BCOM LAW AND LLB

R.3.1 APPROACH

The new curriculum will be phased in from 2013 on the Potchefstroom and Mafikeng Campuses. It will be introduced for the first time at the Vaal Campus in 2014/15. Therefore the rules in this document do not apply to the Vaal Campus. First year students, in Potchefstroom and Mafikeng, will be registered for the new curriculum in 2013 while all students in their second, third and fourth study years will complete their studies according to the current curriculum which will be phased out by the end of 2015. Credit will be given for RPL purposes in accordance with the table in R.4.

Repeaters will be accommodated by allowing them to write a third examination in order to enable them to pass modules which are not be offered in the new curriculum, or those which will be offered in another format, for example modules which become year modules. Learners who do not pass the third examination opportunity will still have the option to apply to the Faculty's Administrative Manager to register for outstanding modules with UNISA in order to enable them to complete their studies according to the rules applicable to the current curriculum. If a module is still offered in the same format in the new curriculum students will not be allowed to register at UNISA unless there is clash on the timetable that cannot be solved in any other way. With regard to time-table clashes it is emphasized that learners are not allowed to enrol for a module, if, according to the standard lecture, test and examination timetable, a clash occurs with another module for which the student has enrolled.

R.3.2 COMPARISON BETWEEN THE CURRENT AND NEW CURRICULA AND TRANSITIONAL ARRANGEMENTS

Introduction to Law (JURI 111) retains its current name but the format and content changes in that it will in future be combined with Legal Skills (JURI 122) in order to address the development of skills demanded by the legal profession. The new combined module will be offered over a year (instead of a mere semester) and it will have a new code, namely IURI 171. Repeaters register for the new module, but they will be allowed to register at UNISA for ILW 1501 if they wish to do so. In order to receive credit for IURI 171, a learner must have passed both Introduction to Law (JURI 111) and Legal Skills (JURI 122). Learners will not receive any credit in the new curriculum for the fact that they have passed only JURI 111 or JURI 122.

Language Skills in Legal Context (JURI 112) will be redeveloped in co-operation with the School for Languages and becomes a year module which will also be offered at levels 2 and 3. New codes will be allocated to the new modules, viz. IURI 174 (IURI 274 and IURI 375 on levels 2 and 3). Learners who have to repeat JURI 112 register for the new module (IURI 174), but will also be allowed to register at UNISA for AFK 1504 and ENN 106J if they wish to do so. Learners will not receive credit for IURI 174 by virtue of the fact that they passed JURI 112. Students will have to repeat IURI 174 even if they passed JURI 112 in terms of the new curriculum.

History of Law (JURI 113) is combined with Contemporary Foundations of South African Law to form *History of South African Law* which will be offered as a year module with a new code viz. IURI 172. Repeaters may register for the new module, or they may register at UNISA for FLS 1501 if they wish to do so. In order to receive credit for IURI 172, a learner must have passed both History of Law (JURI 113) and Contemporary Foundations of South African Law (JURI 123). In other words, they will not receive any credit in the new curriculum by virtue of the fact that they have passed only JURI 113 or JURI 123.

The **Law of Persons** (JURI 114) retains its current name, format and content, but has a new code, IURI 111. Repeaters register for the new module. In order to receive credit for IURI 111, a learner must have passed JURI 114.

The compulsory modules Introduction to **Academic Literacy** (AGLA/E 111) and Academic Literacy (AGLA/E 121) remain part of the curriculum. Repeaters register for the same modules depending on circumstances.

ABCD 111 and ABCD 121 (which refers to the language elective modules a learner may choose from in the first year) remain part of the curriculum at the Potchefstroom Campus. Repeaters register for the same modules. It is envisaged that, at the Potchefstroom Campus, the list of modules may be expanded so as to include modules other than language modules. Due to the fact that AGLE 111 bears credits on the Mafikeng Campus it has been decided that no elective will be offered at that campus for the time being.

Indigenous Law (JURI 121) retains its current name, format and content, but has a new code, IURI 121. Repeaters register for the new module. In order to receive credit for IURI 121, a learner must have passed JURI 121.

Legal Skills (JURI 122) will not exist in its present format as it is incorporated into Introduction to Law. Repeaters register for the new module (IURI 171), but they will be allowed to register at UNISA for SCL 1501 if they wish to do so. In order to receive credit for IURI 171, a learner must have passed both Introduction to Law (JURI 111) and Legal Skills (JURI 122). Learners will not receive any credit in the new curriculum by virtue of the fact that they have passed JURI 122.

Contemporary Foundations of South African Law (JURI 123)) is combined with *History of Law* (JURI 113) and will be known as *History of South African Law* which will be offered as a year module and will receive a new code viz. IURI 172. Repeaters may register for the new module, or they may register at UNISA for FLS 1502 if they wish to do so. In order to receive credit for IURI 172, a learner must have passed both History of Law (JURI 113) and Contemporary Foundations of South African Law (JURI 123). In other words, they will not receive any credit in the new curriculum by virtue of the fact that they have passed only JURI 113 or JURI 123.

Law of Succession (JURI 124) is combined with Administration of (deceased) Estates (JURI 421) and will be known as Law of Succession and Administration of Estates which will be offered as a year module in the third year and will receive a new code viz. IURI 374. Learners who repeat Law of Succession (JURI 124) register at UNISA for PVL2602. Learners who repeat Administration of Estates cannot register at UNISA since there is no equivalent module. They will therefore receive exemption from classes and will write a separate exam paper on the contents of JURI 421. Alternatively, they may register for IURI 374.

In order to receive credit for IURI 374, a learner must have passed both *Law of Succession* (JURI 124) and *Administration of Estates* (JURI 421). In other words, they will not receive any credit in the new curriculum by virtue of the fact that they have passed only JURI 123 or JURI 421.

Criminal Law: General Principles (JURI 211) retains its current name, format and content, but has a new code, IURI 211. Repeaters register for the new module. In order to receive credit for IURI 211 in the new curriculum a learner must have passed JURI 211 (in other words, learners who have passed JURI 211, will receive recognition for IURI 211).

Constitutional Law (JURI 214) retains its current name, format and content, but has a new code, IURI 212. Learners who have passed JURI 214 will receive recognition for IURI 212 and repeaters will register for IURI 212.

Entrepreneurial Law (JURI 215) is no longer offered in the second year, but in the first semester of the third year, as IURI 311. However, the core content of the two modules is the same. Learners who have passed JURI 215 will receive recognition for IURI 311 and repeaters will register for IURI 311.

Family Law (JURI 216) will become a year module in the new curriculum and its contents will accordingly be adjusted so as to include *inter alia* Child Law. It will no longer be offered in the second year, but in the first year as IURI 173. IURI 173 will be offered in 2013 for all first year students while JURI 216 will also be offered for second year students in the current curriculum. In order to receive recognition for IURI 173 learners must have passed JURI 216. Students who do not pass JURI 216 in 2013 may register for IURI 173 or they may register at UNISA for PVL 2601 if they are currently (2012) first year students.

Interpretation of Statutes (JURI 217) retains its current format and content, but has a new descriptive name (Legal Interpretation) and code, visually IURI 213. Learners who have passed JURI 217 will receive recognition for IURI 213 and repeaters will register for IURI 213.

Criminal Procedure is currently offered as two separate year modules, being JURI 213 and JURI 223. From 2013 it will be offered as a year module in the second year with a new code: IURI 271. However, the contents remain the same. Repeaters may register for IURI 271 or they may register at UNISA for CMP 2601 if they repeat JURI 213 and CMP 3701 if they repeat JURI 223. In order to receive credit for IURI 271 a learner must have passed both JURI 213 and JURI 223 (in other words, they will not receive any recognition in the new curriculum by virtue of the fact that they have passed only JURI 213 or JURI 223).

Criminal Law: Specific Crimes (JURI 221) retains its current name, format and content, but has a new code, IURI 221. The modules are comparable and repeaters register for the new module. In order to receive credit for IURI 221 in the new curriculum, a learner must have passed JURI 221.

Labour Law (JURI 224) retains its current name, format and content, but has a new code, IURI 222. Repeaters register for the new module. In order to receive credit for IURI 222 in the new curriculum, a learner must have passed JURI 224.

Law of Delict (JURI 225) retains its current name and content, but has a new code, IURI 273. From 2013 it will become a year module. In order to receive recognition for IURI 273 learners must have passed JURI 225. Repeaters may register for IURI 273 or they may register at UNISA for PVL 3703 if they wish to do so.

Law of Property (JURI 226) retains its current name and content, but has a new code, IURI 272. From 2013 it will become a year module. In order to receive recognition for IURI 272 learners must have passed JURI 226. Repeaters register for IURI 272, or they may register at UNISA for PVL 3701 if they wish to do so.

Civil Procedure in the Magistrates' Court (JURI 311) retains its current name, format and content, but has a new code, IURI 321. Repeaters register for the new module and learners who have passed JURI 311 will receive recognition for IURI 321.

Introduction to Jurisprudence (JURI 313) moves from the third to the fourth year and the code becomes IURI 412. The modules are comparable and learners who have passed JURI 313 will receive recognition for IURI 412. Repeaters register for the new module.

Law of Evidence is currently offered as two separate year modules, being JURI 314 and JURI 325. From 2013 it will be offered as a year module in the third year with a new code: IURI 371. However, the contents remain the same. Repeaters may register for IURI 371 or they may register at UNISA for EVI 3702 if they repeat JURI 314 and EVI 3702 if they repeat JURI 325. In order to receive credit for IURI 371, a learner must have passed both JURI 314

and JURI 325 (in other words, they will not receive any recognition in the new curriculum by virtue of the fact that they have passed only JURI 314 or JURI 325).

Principles of Contracts (JURI 315) retains its current format and content but it becomes a year module with a new code, IURI 373. Learners who have passed JURI 315 will receive recognition for IURI 373. Repeaters may register for IURI 373 or they may register at UNISA for PVL 3702 if they wish to do so.

Public International Law (JURI 316) retains its current format and content but it becomes a year module with a new code, IURI 372. Learners who have passed JURI 316 will receive recognition for IURI 372. Repeaters may register for IURI 372 or they may register at UNISA for LCP 4801 if they wish to do so.

Administrative Law (JURI 321) retains its name, content and format but moves to the first semester and becomes IURI 312. Learners who have passed JURI 321 will receive recognition for IURI 312. Repeaters register for the new module.

Civil Procedure in the Higher Courts (JURI 323) retains its name, content and format but moves to the first semester in the fourth year and becomes IURI 411. Learners who have passed JURI 323 will receive recognition for IURI 411. Repeaters register for the new module.

Fundamental Rights (JURI 324) gets a new code: IURI 223. It moves from the third to the second year which means that two year groups will enrol for this module in 2014 and that arrangements should be made to ensure that sufficient lecture halls will be made available. Learners who have passed JURI 324 will receive recognition for IURI 223 and repeaters will register for IURI 223. All second and third year learners will register for IURI 223 in 2014.

Law of Insolvency (JURI 326) retains its name, content and format but becomes IURI 322. Learners who have passed JURI 326 will receive recognition for IURI 322. Repeaters register for the new module.

Specific Contracts (JURI 327) retains its name, content and format but moves to the fourth year first semester and becomes IURI 413. Learners who have passed JURI 327 will receive recognition for IURI 413. Repeaters register for the new module.

No electives will be available in the third study year. Modules which are electives in the third study year of the current curriculum move to the fourth year (please refer to the notes at the end of this document with regard to transitional rules which will apply to these modules).

Legal Practice and Clinical Law (JURI 312) becomes Legal Practice and has a new code, IURI 414 (it is offered in the final year, despite the code). However, it retains its current format and content. Repeaters register for IURI 414 and learners who have passed JURI 312 will receive recognition for IURI 414.

The module **Research Methodology** (JURI 317) will no longer be offered in its present form as it is absorbed in Introduction to Law (IURI 171) and the newly developed Language course (IURI 174, IURI 274 and IURI 375). It is furthermore envisaged that learners in their final year of study should attend a workshop on research methodology at the beginning of the year in order to refresh their memory and to receive instructions regarding the completion of the Research Project (IURI 471).

Law of Negotiable Instruments and Electronic Commerce (JURI 411) changes to Banking Law with a new code, IURI 421 and will be offered in the second semester of the final year. The modules are comparable and repeaters register for the new module. Learners who have passed JURI 411 will receive recognition for IURI 421.

Road Accident Compensation and Insurance Law (JURI 414) will no longer be offered in its present format. The Road Accident Compensation component will in future form part of The Law of Damages. The new combination will be called *Law of Damages and Road Accident*

Compensation, will be offered as an elective in the fourth year on the Potchefstroom Campus only and the code is IURP 412. *The Law of Insurance* component stands on its own and becomes an elective in the fourth year on the Potchefstroom Campus only and the code is IURP 413. Learners who have passed JURI 414 will receive recognition for IURP 413 and learners who have passed JURI 415 will receive recognition for IURP 412 only if they have passed JURI 414 as well. Students who have to repeat JURI 414 register for IURP 412 and IURP 413 or they may register at UNISA for LML 4805 and LPL 4803 as they wish. Students who have to repeat JURI 415 register for IURP 412 or they may register at UNISA for LPL 4802.

Law of Damages (JURI 415) will no longer be offered in its present form as it will be combined with Road Accident Compensation under the name of *Law of Damages and Road Accident Compensation* and with IURP 412 as its code. Learners who have passed JURI 415 will receive recognition for IURP 412 only if they have passed JURI 414 as well. Students who have to repeat JURI 415 register for IURP 412 or for LPL 4802 at UNISA.

Legal Practice and Clinical Law (JURI 322) becomes Legal Practice and has a new code, IURI 422. However, it retains its current format and content. Repeaters register for IURI 324 and learners who have passed JURI 322 will receive recognition for IURI 324.

Administration of Estates (JURI 421) will no longer be offered in its present form as it will be combined with Law of Succession (JURI 124). The name of the new module is *Law of Succession and Administration of Estates* which will be offered in the third year as a year module and its code is IURI 374. Learners who repeat *Law of Succession* (JURI 124) may register for the new module, or they may register at UNISA for PVL2602 if they wish to do so. Learners who repeat *Administration of Estates* cannot register at UNISA since there is no equivalent module. They will therefore receive exemption from classes and will be allowed to write a separate exam paper based on the contents of JURI 421. Alternatively, they may register for IURI 374. In order to receive credit for IURI 374, a learner must have passed both *Law of Succession* (JURI 124) and *Administration of Estates* (JURI 421). In other words, they will not receive any credit in the new curriculum by virtue of the fact that they have passed only JURI 124 or JURI 421.

Enrichment and Estoppel (JURI 423) retains its name, content and format but becomes an elective in the fourth year on the Potchefstroom Campus only and its code is IURP 424. Learners who have passed JURI 423 will receive recognition for IURP 424. Repeaters register for the new module or for PVL 3704 at UNISA.

Jurisprudence and Ethics (JURI 424) retains its name, content and format but becomes IURI 423. Learners who have passed JURI 424 will receive recognition for IURI 423. Repeaters register for the new module.

The **Mini-Dissertation** (JURI 425), previously a semester module, becomes a year module called *Research Project* (IURI 471) which will be completed under the guidance of a study leader appointed by the Faculty. Students will be expected to attend a workshop on research methodology in the beginning of the year where they will get instructions on the writing of their research proposal, research plan and collection of basic material. Learners who have passed JURI 425 will receive recognition for IURI 471. Repeaters register for IURI 471.

R.3.2.1 ELECTIVES

No electives are available in the second and third study years.

Learners must choose three electives from the following modules during the first semester of the fourth year:

R.3.2.1.1 First semester electives to be taught only on the Potchefstroom Campus

Environmental Law (IURE 411), previously JURE 411; the modules are comparable. A learner who has passed JURE 411 will receive recognition for IURE 411 and repeaters register for IURE 411;

Moot Court (IURE 412), previously JURE 412; the modules are comparable. A learner who has passed JURE 412 will receive recognition for IURE 412 and repeaters register for IURE 412;

Intellectual Property Law (IURE 422), previously JURE 413 moves to the second semester; the modules are comparable. A learner who has passed JURE 413 will receive recognition for IURE 422 and repeaters register for IURE 422;

Alternative Dispute Resolution (IURE 413), previously JURE 311. The modules are comparable although the content will differ slightly in order to adapt to the outcomes for NQF level 8. A learner who has passed JURE 311 will receive recognition for IURE 413 and repeaters register for IURE 413;

Tax Law (IURE 414), previously JURE 313. The modules are comparable although the content will differ slightly in order to adapt to the outcomes for NQF level 8. A learner who has passed JURE 313 will receive recognition for IURE 414 and repeaters register for IURE 414.

Accounting for Law Students (ACCL 111), previously Legal Accounting (RERP 211). While it remains an elective, it moves from the third year to the fourth year and has 12 credits. Consequently, the content and format will be adapted to provide for these changes. Learners may only register for Accounting for Law Students (ACCL 221) if they have passed Accounting in grade 12, ACCL 111, ACCS 111 or ACCF 111. Learners who have passed Accounting in grade 12, ACCS 111 or ACCF may not register for ACCL 111.

Socio-economic Rights (IURP 411), previously JURP 411; the modules are comparable. A learner who has passed JURP 411 will receive recognition for IURP 411 and repeaters register for IURP 411.

Law of Damages and Road Accident Compensation (IURP 412) is a new configuration (previously JURI 414 and 415). Learners who have passed JURI 414 will receive recognition for IURP 413 (Law of Insurance) and learners who have passed JURI 415 will receive recognition for IURP 412 only if they have passed JURI 414 as well. Students who have to repeat JURI 414 register for IURP 412 and IURP 413 or they may register at UNISA for LML 4805 and LPL 4803 if they are not on campus any more. Students who have to repeat JURI 415 register for IURP 412 or they may register at UNISA for LPL 4802.

Insurance Law (IURP 413), previously part of JURI 414 is now a separate and new module with different contents. Learners who have passed JURI 414 will receive recognition for IURP 413 and learners who have to repeat JURI 414 register for IURP 412 and IURP 413 or they may register at UNISA for LML 4805 and LPL 4803 if they are no longer on campus.

Learners must choose three electives from the following during the second semester in the fourth year:

R.3.2.1.2 Second semester electives to be taught only on the Potchefstroom Campus:

Private International Law (IURE 421) previously JURE 421. The modules are comparable. Learners who have passed JURE 421 will receive recognition for IURE 421 and repeaters register for IURE 421.

Accounting for Law Students (ACCL 221), previously Legal Accounting (RERP 221). While it remains an elective, it moves from the third year to the fourth year and has 12 credits. Consequently, the content and format will be adapted to provide for these changes. Learners who wish to register for Legal Accounting (ACCL 221) should have passed Accounting in grade 12, ACCF111, ACCS 111 or ACCL 111.

Land Law and Registration (IURP 421), previously JURP 421. The modules are comparable. Learners who have passed JURP 421 will receive recognition for IURP 421 and repeaters register for IURP 421.

Development and Local Government Law (IURP 422), previously JURP 321. The modules are comparable although the content will differ slightly in order to adapt to the outcomes for NQF level 8. Learners who have passed JURP 321 will receive recognition for IURP 422 and repeaters register for IURP 422.

Legal Pluralism: Religious Systems (IURP 423), previously JURP 323; the modules are comparable although the content will differ slightly in order to adapt to the outcomes for level 8. Learners who have passed JURP 323 will receive recognition for IURP 423 and repeaters register for IURP 423.

Enrichment and Estoppel (IURP 424) previously JURI 423; the modules are comparable. Learners who have passed JURI 423 will receive recognition for IURP 424 and repeaters register for IURP 424.
